### A LETTER FROM PASTOR RUDOLPH

So when they had come together, they asked [Jesus], "Lord, will you at this time restore the kingdom to Israel?" He said to them, "It is not for you to know times or seasons that the Father has fixed by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." And when he had said these things, as they were looking on, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. - Acts 1:6-9

May is a month that celebrates many things, Mother's Day and Memorial Day being important days that we honor great servants in our society. We honor mothers, who sacrifice much for the sake of the health and well-being of their children. We honor military service members who gave up their lives for the sake of the health and well-being of their fellow Americans. These are great days when we get to honor the great sacrifices people make on behalf of others. As Christians, sacrifice is near and dear to our knowing and understanding of love, for the greatest picture of love is in Christ's great self-sacrifice on behalf of His bride, the Church. This was the great celebration of April this year, where Christ gave up His life on the cross before taking it up again on Easter. These May holidays do a great job showing different ways and different levels of sacrifice in the ways we love those around us.

But May is also a time of change, whether it be from the April Showers to May Flowers or from winter home to summer home. It is the same in the Church as well. We will continue with the season of Easter for several weeks, and although we celebrate Easter every Sunday, the next Church holy-day comes in May, when we celebrate Christ's Ascension into heaven.

From now on, Jesus would not walk around with His disciples as He had for the past three years. Instead, He would be with them in a different way, through His Word and Sacrament. I'm sure His disciples longed for things to go back to the way they used to be as they stood, gazing into heaven, as Jesus left them. Yet two angels shake them to reality: Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking into heaven? This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven. What a great promise that is!

The day is coming when Christ will come again, just as He said. But there are things to do. As Jesus said, they would be witnesses. Just as Jesus Christ is the faithful witness (as you've heard in our Sunday sermon series on the book of Revelation), we too will be His witnesses to all people around the world. Let us not sit back and gaze into heaven as if there is no work to be done. Let us witness to the great things God has done for us! Look for ways in your everyday lives at work, at home, at the store, and wherever you might be "to the end of the earth" to witness to this great truth. Act as God's witness to your neighbors around you, as kind and loving servants who have a great hope for the time when Jesus will come again to bring them to eternal life with Him. ### FINANCIAL UPDATE

As promised, the Board of Directors and Business

Administrator are committed to keeping the members of Peace updated on our financial situation throughout the year. Here are a few noteworthy highlights from the first quarter of 2025:

#### What does this mean?

Our revenue (envelope giving) was over budget and our expenses were under budget. We had a loss, however the loss was not as great as anticipated at the time the budget was accepted.

Additionally, our mortgage principal (as of April 17) is \$389,507.25. We have not yet converted to a permanent mortgage, therefore we are still making interest-only payments (while paying down the principal).

The staff is very aware of the deficit budget in place this year and has been diligently doing their part to help control expenses. And the congregation has responded generously and envelope giving has been very healthy thus far. THANK YOU ALL!!


#### The Shield of the Apostle Philip: A Symbol of Faith and Evangelism

As we have seen, each of the twelve apostles is often associated with a unique symbol or emblem that represents their life, mission, and martyrdom. The Apostle Philip, known for his role in spreading the Gospel and for his bold faith, is commonly represented by a crosstopped staff or a basket filled with loaves of bread.

However, one of the more striking and lesser-known representations is Philip's shield – as we see in our Old Sanctuary Cross – depicted with a cross and two loaves. Sometimes the shield is set against a background of deep blue.

The cross signifies Philip's unwavering commitment to Christ and the Gospel. According to early Christian accounts, Philip preached extensively in Asia Minor and was ultimately martyred for his faith—crucified upside down in the city of Hierapolis. His shield's cross is not only a symbol of his martyrdom but a reminder of his call to follow Christ, no matter the cost.

The loaves of bread recall Philip's role in the miraculous feeding of the 5,000 (John 6:5-7), where Jesus asked Philip where they could buy food for the crowd. His response—realistic yet limited by human understanding—opened the door for Jesus to reveal divine abundance. The loaves thus serve as a powerful symbol of provision, humility, and the transformative power of faith.



Together, the elements of St. Philip's shield reflect a legacy of bold witness, compassionate ministry, and trust in the miraculous. It stands as a reminder for today's believers to step forward in faith, even when the task seems impossible.

Numbered envelopes are available on the table in the East Lobby. Choose a number-that number is your donation amount. Then, follow the steps on the information sheet to make your contribution.





### Peace's Mental Health Advocates are thrilled to share Mental Health America's 2025 theme: "Turn Awareness into Action."

This theme celebrates the progress made in recognizing the importance of mental health – and challenges us to turn understanding into meaningful steps toward change.

The "Cs of mental health" refer to five key elements that contribute to overall mental well-being: Clarity, Connection, Coping, Control, and

Compassion. These elements work together to foster a healthy mindset and emotional well-being.

**Clarity:** This refers to gaining clarity on your thoughts, emotions, and goals, which can be challenging during times of stress or mental health difficulties.

**Connection:** Humans thrive on connection, and it's crucial to maintain strong relationships with others, whether friends, family, or support systems.

**Coping:** Developing healthy coping mechanisms to manage stress and navigate challenging situations is essential for mental health.

**Control:** This refers to feeling in control of your own thoughts, emotions, and actions, rather than feeling overwhelmed or helpless.

**Compassion:** Cultivating compassion for yourself and others, including understanding and empathy, is a vital aspect of mental well-being.

Please take time this month and every month to practice positive mental wellness. It is our duty as the Body of Christ to work together to uplift and support those who are mentally struggling.

Peace Lutheran offers support through several different ministries such as GriefShare and Stephen Ministry. The Peace Lutheran Mental Health Advocates have also put together an information station regarding mental health issues. Look for the Mental Wellness Center on the rolling cart currently in the East Lobby by the choir loft door. This collection of resources includes topics such as anxiety, substance abuse, and trauma, among many, many others.





### Ministry Needs that Stephen Ministers Could Meet



Who do you know at Peace, in your family, in your neighborhood, or perhaps even yourself who is struggling with one of the situations named below? These are circumstances in which an individual could benefit from the emotional and spiritual care of a Stephen Minister:

**GRIEF:** over separation from a loved one through death, divorce, or regarding permanent disability or mobility at home.

MAJOR MEDICAL CRISIS: diagnosis or treatment of a terminal illness, rehab from an accident or injury, dealing with an ongoing health issue or chronic pain, or palliative or hospice care.

JOB RELATED CRISIS: job loss, long term unemployment or under employment, job stress, retirement issues.

**BROKEN RELATIONSHIPS:** with a spouse or significant other, between parents and children, siblings or friends.

These are a few of the situations with which Stephen Ministers are trained to walk along side of you. Read the above carefully and see if you can identify someone in your circle of friends or family experiencing one of these life issues. Talk with them about Stephen Ministry and discern whether this person could benefit from the presence of a Stephen Minister in their life. Then ask their permission to refer them to our leadership team and we will take it from there.

There is no obligation or commitment at that time. If you are that person in need, please call one of us. We will share this ministry with you and answer questions. Stephen Ministry leadership includes Pastor Teeple, Rick Kirkton, and Ellen Luepke.

In the June Newsletter we will share even more areas in which Stephen Ministers are trained and ready to walk the journey with you.

# History of Mother's Day

Anna M. Jarvis (1864-1948) lover her mother dearly. It was Anna who first suggested a national day to honor all mothers.

At a memorial service for her mother on May 10, 1908, Anna gave a carnation, her mother's favorite flower, to each person in attendance. Within a few years, the idea to honor mothers gained popularity, and Mother's Day was soon observed annually in many large cities of the United States.

On May 9, 1914, by an act of Congress, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed the second Sunday of May as Mother's Day. He established the day as a time for "public expression of our love and reverence for the mothers of our country." By then, it had become customary to wear white carnations in honor of departed mothers, and red carnations to honor the living. This custom continues to this day.
