Dear friends in Christ,

As of May 25, our mortgage principal is \$380,870.27. We have not yet converted to a permanent mortgage, therefore we are still making interest-only payments (while paying down the principal). This construction loan will convert to a mortgage at the end of the year.

The Shield of St. Bartholomew: A Symbol of Faith and Witness

This shield stands as a powerful emblem of faith, sacrifice, and unwavering discipleship. St.
Bartholomew's shield traditionally features three flaying knives—sometimes crossed or shown with a human skin—symbols tied to the manner of his martyrdom.

St. Bartholomew, one of the twelve apostles, is the same person as Nathanael, who is mentioned in the Gospel of John. While "Bartholomew" (meaning son of Tolmai) is the name used in the Synoptic Gospels and Acts, "Nathanael" (meaning God has given) is

his name in John's Gospel. In John's Gospel he is introduced by Philip and comes to believe in Jesus after a striking encounter (John 1:43-51). This connection deepens our understanding of the man behind the symbol—one who moved from honest skepticism to bold proclamation.

According to tradition, Bartholomew carried the Gospel to far regions such as Armenia, India, and Mesopotamia. His bold witness to Christ ultimately led to his martyrdom by flaying. Though the imagery on his shield is stark, it speaks of a deeper truth: the knife is not only a tool of suffering, but a symbol of faithful endurance and spiritual triumph.

Bartholomew's shield challenges us to consider the cost of discipleship and the courage required to live out our faith in a skeptical world. As we reflect on his legacy, may we be inspired to follow Christ with the same devotion, integrity, and boldness.


LWM Almsgiving Project

How Summer Affects Mental Health

One of the main ways the summer can help with mental health is through the sunshine. Because of the warmer weather, many of us spend more time outdoors in the summer, plus the sun is out for longer than in other seasons.

The increased sun exposure boosts our vitamin D levels, and can even improve mood, leading to better mental health. Spending time in the sun also helps your body produce more melatonin (sleep hormone) at night, allowing you to sleep better and overall feel better.

While there are some stressors unique to summer, such as feeling overwhelmed by the amount of activities and getting less sleep, it is a good time for most people's mental health. Therefore, it is a good time to set habits and prepare for the coming months that are colder and less energizing.

Forming Habits

- <u>Set boundaries.</u> You don't have to say yes to every opportunity you are presented with. Seek out the activities and plans that seem the best to you and take breaks when you need them.
- <u>Set a sleep schedule.</u> Maintaining a consistent sleep schedule can help ensure you get adequate sleep. One possible way to do this is by sleeping with the sun – don't stay up for too long once it is dark outside.
- Engage in physical activity. Improving your physical health can have great benefits on your mental health. With the warmer weather comes more opportunities for outdoor exercise and play. Set a standard for how active you are now so that you will more likely find ways to stay active moving forward.
- <u>Have fun!</u> Making an effort to intentionally improve your mental health is beneficial, but don't let it get in the way of your fun. Setting rhythms, including therapy if needed, are great, but you need to enjoy life too. Find a balance between responsibility and fun!

STEPHEN MINISTRY IS HERE TO HELP



This month we add to that list:

- Chronic situations-long term illness or disability and also the family member who cares for these special needs
- End of life or hospice situations-Stephen Ministers are trained in this area to minister to the dying person and/or loved ones.
- Challenges related to military service-men and women called to service, deployment, and their families. Adjustments upon returning from service.
- Major life situations—including but not limited to: new baby, adoption, parenting a grandchild, blended family, empty nest.

The above examples don't necessarily have to be in crisis mode, but do represent significant change and challenges in a person's life that could result in blessing through the presence of a Stephen Minister in your life or the life of someone you know and care about.

Please take the time to ponder how a Stephen Minister could positively affect your life. They are ready to walk along side of you during this stressful stage. Remember your Stephen Minister is a care-giver but God is the Care-Giver. Call or speak to one if the Stephen leaders for more information. 


PEACE'S WALKING PATH

THE ORIGIN OF FATHER'S DAY

One Sunday in 1909, Sonora Smart Dodd listened to a sermon honoring mothers. Her mother had died some years before, so her father had raised her by himself. Dodd wondered why there wasn't a day to honor fathers, so she arranged a tribute to her father at a church in Spokane, Washington. The date was June 19, 1910. Many people believe this was the beginning of Father's Day.

Another account holds that a West Virginia church held a tribute service for fathers in 1908, following a mine explosion that killed 360 men. Regardless of which story is correct, President Calvin Coolidge was the first president to designate a special day to honor fathers. In 1924, he proclaimed the third Sunday in June as Father's Day.
