A Letter from Pastor Rudolph



Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice; and he fell on his face at Jesus' feet, giving him thanks. Now he was a Samaritan.

What an amazing display of faith! This leper was one of ten who were cleansed when they cried out to Jesus, *Jesus*, *Master*, *have mercy on us!* (*Luke 17:16*) These lepers had been outcasts for a long time, longing to rejoin society and enter into God's temple once again. How long they must have gone without going to church! So Jesus intervened. He saved them and brought them back into the Church community once again, telling them to go to the priests at the temple to prove that they had been healed.

Yet one of them did something different. I'm sure the 9 others thought it was weird that he seemed to ignore Jesus' directions. He said, *Go and show yourselves to the priests*, yet this leper turned around and went back to Jesus! The 9 may have even thought themselves to be doing the right thing. Jesus thought different. When this one leper came back, he fell down at Jesus' feet, giving Him thanks and praise for all that Jesus had done for him. But why?

As we talked about a few weeks ago in the sermon, this leper returned to His Master, Jesus, the Great High Priest, the one who healed him of his leprosy. Our Master is so very gracious, giving to us again and again everything we need for this body and life. But what do we do with those gifts? For me, and I'm sure for many of you, I tend to take the gift and run off with it to do my own thing, never thinking about where it came from. Sometimes I don't even think to recognize that it was God who gave me the gift in the first place!

And so we have this challenge for us: to recognize the "daily bread" that we prayed for and that God has indeed given to us by grace. When you recognize these gifts, take a moment to stop what you're doing, turn around, and run Jesus. Let's fall at the feet of Jesus together this month to give Him thanks and praise. Martin Luther gave us a list of everyday things that we should give thanks for. Take a moment this month and pray through this list. Don't despair about the ones you may not have, but instead pray for what you don't have while still giving thanks for the "daily bread" that God has already given you!

Give thanks for all the ways God has worked in our lives, from the simple paycheck we get to the great salvation we have been given! When you gather for Thanksgiving with friends or family, take a moment and recognize God for the great gifts you have been given, whether it's the mashed potatoes and turkey in front of you or whether it's for the family, friends, and other great people God his seated next to you! We all have been given great blessings by our loving and caring Heavenly Father, even if it's not easy to see them sometimes. But don't wait for Thanksgiving to get started! Stop what you're doing, turn toward Jesus, fall at His feet with the faithful leper, and pray with us, *O give thanks to the LORD, for He is good, and His mercy endures forever. Amen.*

Years ago, I was a circuit counselor to about six churches and I remember a couple of situations like we are experiencing here at Peace. I write this with the hope that it will create some understanding, patience, and desire to help in whatever way we can as it relates to our *one* pastor.

Pastor Rudolph is a relatively new graduate from our Fort Wayne seminary and since his installation as a pastor here at Peace he has worked alongside Pastor Teeple. For a while, the two pastors shared pastoral responsibilities of our congregation. Now, all of the responsibilities rest upon Pastor Rudolph's shoulders: a new sermon every week, sick and hospital calls, evening and night calls from those needing help, and those just wanting to chat. This can really be an overwhelming situation. Therefore, I ask that all of us, including me, pray daily for Pastor Rudolph. Give him some space, understanding, and words or encouragement and love. He is our pastor sent to us by God Himself.

Our revenue (envelopes+plate+interest) has been consistently over budget this year while we have been able to keep our expenses under budget. We are still recording a loss year-to-date, but the loss is not as great as we anticipated. These numbers do not include gifts that have been given to various funds, ministries or the capital campaign/mortgage reduction. Thank you all for your FAITHFUL giving!!

MORTGAGE/CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

At the Voters' Assembly on Sunday, September 7, the voters passed a motion that gave the Peace Board of Directors permission to pay off the remaining principal balance of the construction loan at the end of November 2025 from various financial accounts.

As of October 8, 2025, our principal balance on the construction loan was \$78,585.92. We are hoping to receive close to \$35,000 toward pledges in these last few months of 2025, which would leave less than \$50,000 to pay on our construction principal. Outstanding pledge balance updates have been placed in your mailboxes.


FAREWELL AND GODSPEED, PASTOR TEEPLE!

Located just inside the entrance of our west parking lot, these blessing boxes serve as a small scale, outside self-serve food pantry.

Items in the boxes are available to anyone struggling with hunger or food insecurity. Items may be taken anonymously and without judgement or cost. If you, or someone you know, are challenged by an over-stretched grocery budget, we encourage you to stop by and take all that you need to see you through.

The blessing boxes provide a special opportunity to serve others in our community. Peace members are welcomed to place non-perishable food items inside the boxes at anytime. Donation items may also be place in

the boxes at anytime. Donation items may also be place in the designated basket under the mailboxes in the West Lobby. Suggested food items for the blessing boxes include:

- items that can be made with water such as instant mashed potatoes or dry pasta
- proteins such as canned tuna, chicken or beef
- breakfast cereal
- creamy peanut butter
- no glass containers or jars, as these may break in colder weather

THE OLD SANCTUARY CROSS The Blank Shield of Judas Iscariot

Among the many traditions of apostolic shields and symbols, few are as haunting as the blank shield of Judas Iscariot. As we have seen with the other symbols and shields, the apostles were often assigned coats of arms as a way of symbolizing their virtues, missions, or martyrdoms. But Judas, the disciple who betrayed Christ, was typically given no symbol or coat of arms at all. Instead, his shield was left bare — a stark, empty field.

This absence of imagery carried profound meaning. While other apostles' shields proclaimed faith, courage, or sacrifice, Judas Iscariot's shield became a silent emblem of betrayal,

dishonor, and the void left by broken loyalty. In medieval times, a blank shield was not neutral but damning: it marked a man with no true allegiance, a knight stripped of honor. Today, the blank shield of Judas serves as a reminder of the power of symbols — not just

Today, the blank shield of Judas serves as a reminder of the power of symbols — not just in what they depict, but also in what they refuse to show. The absence of a mark can itself be the loudest statement of all.

Christmas Cookie Exchange



To observe National Family Caregivers Month 2025, here are five things you can do in November to encourage and support a family caregiver in your life. However you choose to show appreciation to a family caregiver during family caregiver awareness month, make a special effort to make life a bit easier for the family caregivers you know.

How can you show appreciation to a family caregiver?



Provide respite care.

If it's once a week or just once — period — caregivers can benefit greatly from a break from their work. Spend a morning with their loved one while they run errands or take some time for themselves. The gift of your time is priceless.



Check in regularly.

Let them talk about their experiences without offering advice or casting an opinion. Let them know that you see the work they are doing and the value it brings to the family and community. Remember, you don't have to fix their problems. just being able to talk openly and without judgment is often the support they need.



Be specific with your offers.

Avoid saying "let me know if you need anything." Instead, make a specific offer of help. When caregivers are overwhelmed, it can be difficult to ask for help, so the more specific you can be, the better.



Help with chores.

Bring a meal, clean the house, help with laundry, do yard work, or tackle any other life tasks that are hard for caregivers to get to. This helps ease their burden and makes them feel supported.



Keep inviting them.

Even if you know they can't attend an outing or gathering, continued invitations will make a caregiver feel less isolated and let them know that you are thinking of them and value their presence. And you never know when they might be able to make it happen!



Offer encouragement.

A thoughtful card or text message, or even a small gift, can show that you recognize the gift of their service. Be positive about how you appreciate their efforts and see what a great job they're doing.
